

Protect the Power of the People: Stop Attacks on Missouri's Citizen Initiative Petition Process

HJR 43 - Rep. Henderson, R-117 (Bonne Terre)

Missouri's citizen initiative petition process is a tool of direct democracy.

When lawmakers ignore the will of the people, the initiative petition process empowers

Missourians to gather signatures from folks across the state and put a measure directly on the

ballot for every voter to have a say.

- Since 1907, Missourians have made their voices heard through the citizen initiative petition process.
- Voters have used this direct democracy tool to change policy when lawmakers refuse to act. Recent initiative petition campaigns have given Missouri voters a direct say on:
 - Raising the minimum wage,
 - Expanding Medicaid and extend affordable health care coverage to more than 275,000 Missourians,
 - Legalizing medical marijuana,
 - Legalizing adult-use marijuana, and
 - Adopting ethics reform, including campaign contribution limits, for legislators.
- A majority is 50% plus one, not 60%, and not 2/3. Measures passed by a majority as is currently the case reflect the will of the people. Raising the threshold to 60%, as HJR 43 would do, directly undermines the will of the people.
- Missouri's existing process is rigorous lawmakers should not make it harder for the public to make decisions.
- Missourians across the political spectrum have come together & used this direct democracy tool to change policy when lawmakers refuse to act. This power belongs to the people — and politicians have no place trying to change the rules to take that power away.
- Lawmakers should oppose any change to Missouri's citizen initiative petition process that makes it more difficult for Missourians to come together and engage in direct democracy.
